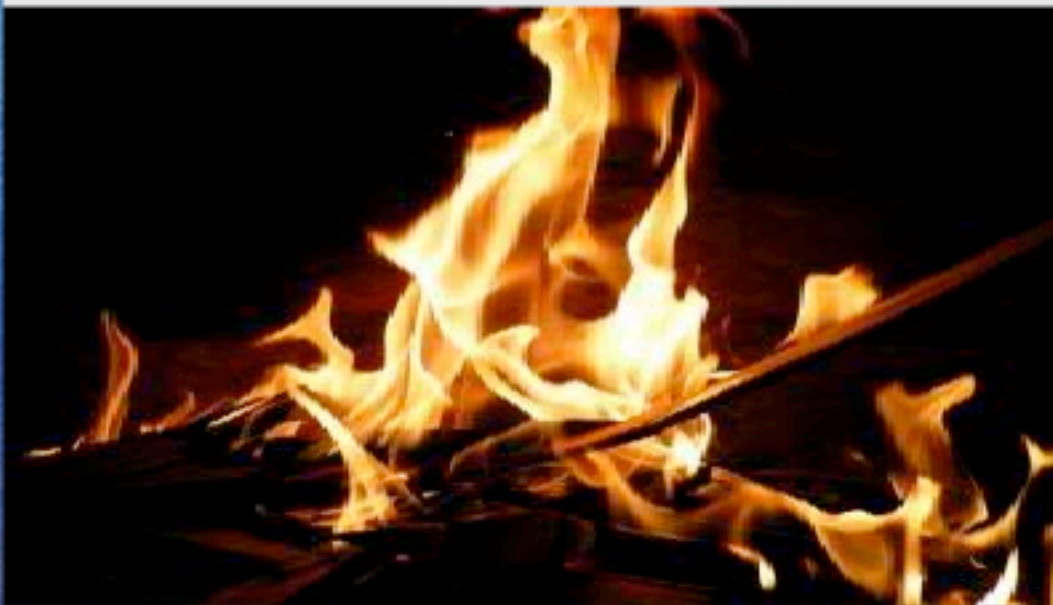




To the poor,

to learn and share**

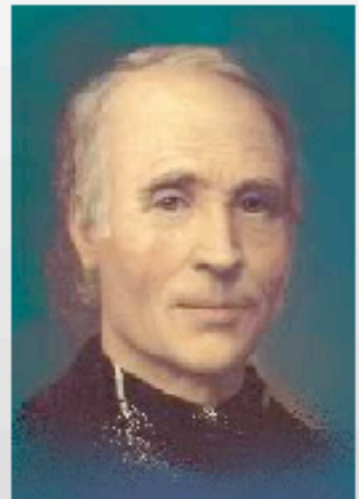




Rosalie met...

lonely...**

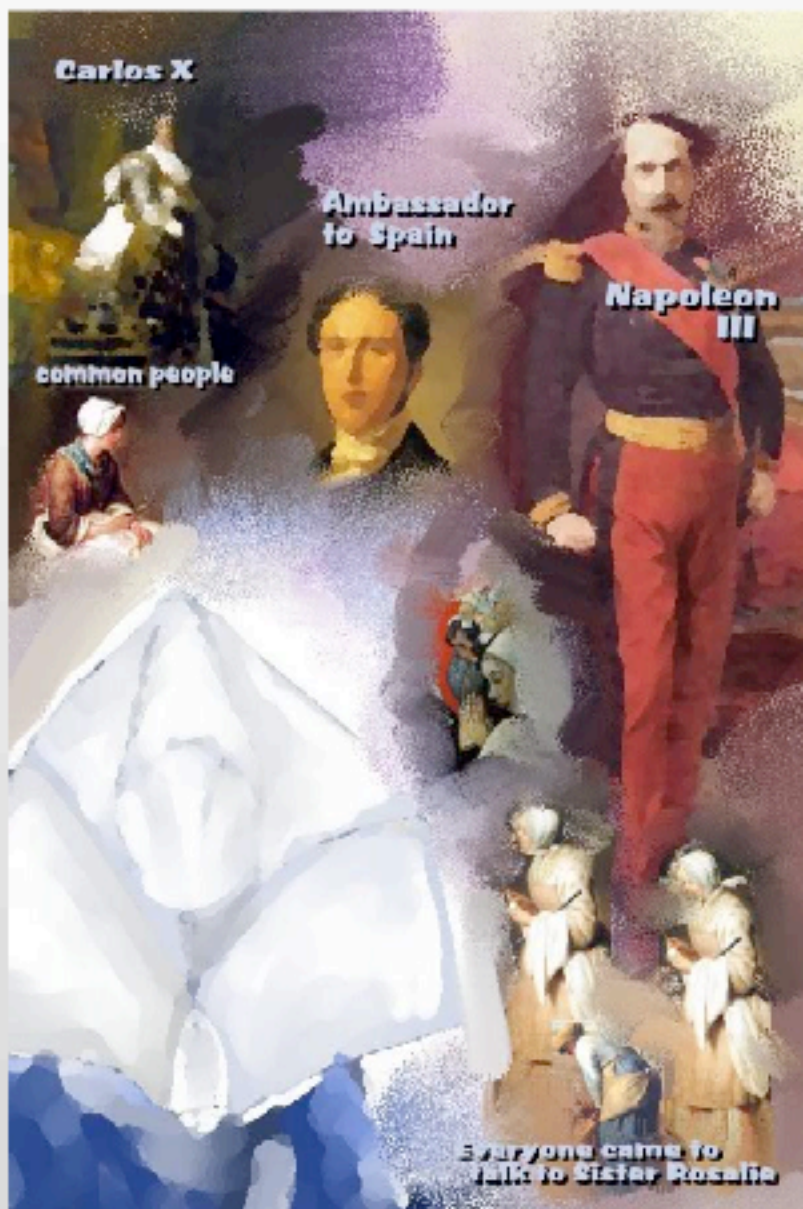

Panthéon, the south side of the Hill of
St. Geneviève - rue Mouffetard,
passage des Patriarches, rue de l'Epée
