## The Virtue of Humility

"Have among yourselves the same attitude that is also yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. Rather, he emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness; and found human in appearance, he humbled himself, becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross."

- Philippians 2:5-8



"I praise God with all my heart for the disposition in which you tell me you now are. Nevertheless, I share the pain you are experiencing because you feel that you are doing nothing. Be thoroughly consoled, my dear Sister, by the thought that you are imitating the state in which the Son of God found Himself when, after leaving the temple where He had been working for the glory of God, He went with the Blessed Virgin and Saint Joseph to obey them. He thereby accomplished the will of God by toiling for many years at the humble tasks of a carpenter's shop. Yet He had come upon earth to labor for the salvation of the entire human race."

There are numerous examples of Jesus' attitude of humble service throughout the Scriptures. St. Louise makes an interesting reference to Jesus' humility when he obediently toiled in the carpenter's shop of his father, even though he would later become the savior of the world. It serves as a reminder to us that no menial tasks are below our station in life, as we certainly cannot claim to be about work more important than that of Jesus. Simple works of charity gain meaning and a certain dignity because Jesus himself did these.

- John 13:14-17



Works, Washing of Feet, Parable of The Pharisee and The Tax Collector

"Two people went up to the temple area to pray; one was a Pharisee and the other was a tax collector. The Pharisee took up his position and spoke this prayer to himself, 'O God, I thank you that I am not like the rest of humanity-- greedy, dishonest, adulterous-or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week, and I pay tithes on my whole income." But the tax collector stood off at a distance and would not even raise his eyes to heaven but beat his breast and prayed, 'O God, be merciful to me a sinner.' I tell you, the latter went home justified, not the former; for everyone who exalts himself [herself] will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself [herself] will be exalted." - Luke 18:10-14
